We hope you enjoyed the Family Beach day and our August luncheon speaker, **Tom Barnett.** We look forward to welcoming Florida Supreme Court **Justice Jamie Grosshans** at our September luncheon on September 17, 2021. We hope you are able to join us. Justice Grosshans is currently the only female serving on our Supreme Court and was appointed by Governor DeSantis. Justice Grosshans is originally from Mississippi and is reputable as a brilliant jurist and lawyer. We are grateful she can join us.

If you are able, please participate in our Constitution Week teaching this September 17, 2021. It is very rewarding. Please watch for announcements.

If your practice of law involves going to Court, please review the new Administrative Order 2021-11 issued by Chief Judge Schwab on August 2, 2021, addressing continued Covid-19 reopening procedures and Court operations for second protocols.

If your practice of law involves going to Court, please have patience with our Court system and all those who work tirelessly to support our Court systems. Everyone is facing backlogs. The Florida Supreme Court requires timely movement of cases. Remote proceedings are again required for all but a narrow set of court hearings/trials. Foreclosure and eviction moratoriums have lifted (except for FHA insured loans, where there is still an eviction moratorium until September

30, 2021). Numerous new civil cases are going

to be filed. It will take the leadership and grace of you, our members, as community leaders help the public maintain its confidence in the legal system as we move forward. Civility and professionalism. Nothing less should be tolerated. Appreciate the blessed opportunity to be able to continue to work and support yourself, your family, and your community



through these troubled waters.

The Martin County Bar Association (MCBA) will welcome Florida Supreme Court Justice Jamie Grosshans as the guest speaker at our monthly luncheon meeting on Friday, September 17, 2021 at Monarch Country Club for networking begins at 11:30 a.m. and lunch will be served promptly at noon.

Justice **Jamie R. Grosshans** was appointed to the Florida Supreme Court on September 14, 2020 by Governor Ron DeSantis. Previously she was appointed to the Fifth District Court of Appeal in 2018 by Governor Rick Scott. Prior to her appointment to the appellate court, she served as an Orange County Court Judge in the Ninth Judicial Circuit of Florida where she presided over criminal and civil matters.

Justice Grosshans was raised in Brookhaven, Mississippi and graduated cum laude from the University of Mississippi School of Law. During law school, she clerked for the Civil Rights Division of the Department of Justice in Washington, D.C., and the United States Attorney's Office for the Northern

District of Mississippi. Following admittance to the Florida Bar, she served as an Assistant State Attorney for the Ninth Circuit of Florida in both the misdemeanor and felony divisions where she tried numerous criminal jury trials.

Justice Grosshans later entered private practice and founded her own law firm where she focused on family law and criminal defense matters for nearly ten years. During this time she also served as an Adjunct Professor at Valencia College where she taught Hospitality Law for the Hospitality and Tourism Management Program. She also frequently volunteered as a guardian ad litem with the Orange County Legal Aid Society. Justice Grosshans has served on state court system advisory committees and has been involved in numerous activities with the Florida Bar and other legal organizations.

Justice Grosshans regularly speaks to lawyers and law students on topics such as challenges in the practice of law, the role of judges, professionalism and respect in the legal profession, criminal law, and family law.

Justice Grosshans' topic will be: The Florida Constitution: Securing the Benefits of our Constitutional Liberties. We look forward to an insightful and engaging program and are looking forward to seeing everyone in-person. The lunch is free to MCBA members and Judges. Guests are welcome to attend and pay the \$30 guest fee at the door (cash or check only).





UCC 9 Sale vs Sub Chapter V - (Part I)



No small business owner wants to file Bankruptcy for himself or his business. As a result, many small businesses fail for lack of taking action that would allow the business to survive.

Few small businesses have the ability to continue to operate and still endure the rigors and the expense of a full-fledged Chapter 11, not to mention the

loss of ownership that can occur when a Chapter 11 collapses into a liquidating Chapter 7!

This leaves small business owners (and especially owner/operators) grasping at straws for alternative solutions; many of which serve only to further propel the enterprise and its owners to a devastating end.

Two of the current highly promoted solutions involve either the avoidance of a bankruptcy filing by reducing corporate debt through what is known as a UCC 9 Sale; or, the advantages incorporated in the new Sub Chapter V under Chapter 11 of the Bankruptcy Code. Sub Chapter V was enacted for the sole purpose of making small business bankruptcy a viable, powerful, effective way for small businesses and their owners to completely restructure their company and reduce or eliminate debt, thus reducing debt service and improving cash flow.


A UCC 9 sale can help the business avoid the necessity of filing bankruptcy but requires a change of ownership of the business and relies on cooperation from creditors to resolve matters for the business owner personally. Still, it can be effective for all parties under the right circumstances.

Bankruptcy under the new Sub Chapter V, on the other hand, provides guidelines that take the decision of what's "fair and equitable" and puts decision-making in the hands of the Judge. As long as the rules are followed, debt relief will occur and owners are no worse off than with a UCC 9 sale and the owner retains the business.

Both processes are extremely complex and neither cures underlying issues that forced the enterprise to its knees in the first place. Nevertheless, each serves a unique purpose and is best used in accordance with the surrounding circumstances and objective of the owners.

While you are waiting for Part II it would be wise to contact a professional to get better informed about each process and determine which serves your best interests.

VOLUNTEERS NEEDED FOR CONSTITUTION WEEK 2021

Judge Alan Forst: Past MCBA President and Constitution Week Co-chair Adam Schwartz: Current MCBA President and Constitution Week Co-chair

The clearest way to show what the rule of law means to us in everyday life is to recall what has happened when there is no rule of law. Dwight D. Eisenhower



For the past eighteen years (with one exception), the MCBA has celebrated the United States Constitution by sending volunteers to our local schools, during Constitution Week, to discuss, in one fashion or another, the Constitution. Public Law 108-247, signed into law in 2004, designated September 17 of each year as "Constitution Day and Citizenship Day." Last year, we created a digital recording (I initially wrote "video," but that's so last decade) that was shown in the schools (or so I've been told).





Why September 17? Because the United States Constitution was signed by a majority of the attendees at the Constitutional Convention on September 17, 1787. Why do we team with the schools? Because, by public law, "[e]ach educational institution that receives Federal funds shall hold an educational program on the United States Constitution on September 17 of each year for the students served by the educational institution." Can we stretch Constitution Day out to a week? Well, the U.S. Code also provides that "[t]he President is requested to issue each year a proclamation inviting the people of the United States to observe Constitution Week, in schools, churches, and other suitable places, with appropriate ceremonies and activities." Constitution Week 2021 runs from Friday September 17 to Thursday September 23.

Now you know the "why." As to the "where"—in our local public schools, though we will raise a glass (of ice tea or water) at our MCBA lunch on Constitution Day. I urge future MCBA presidents to annually schedule a Constitution Week program at the September Bar lunch. We also encourage our lengthy roster of volunteers to propose and present educational programs elsewhere in the community, such as at houses of prayer, public libraries, and recreation centers.

Which leads to the question of "how." Fingers crossed—we plan to return to live presentations this month. We will be hosting a lunch meeting (pizza is on us!) at the courthouse on Wednesday September 8 at noon. We will be sharing lesson plans, materials, and experiences. Several judges are part of this "staff," and therefore this meeting will also be a network-with-the-judges opportunity.

LIABILITY OF SHIP OWNERS TO CRUISE PASSENGERS

Cruising has become favorite form of vacation According to the website, travel world-wide. Cruise Market Watch, "Total worldwide ocean cruise capacity at the end of 2021 will be 581,200 passengers and 323 ships." (https:// cruisemarketwatch.com/capacity/) As the ships grow larger, driven by an increasing demand for cruise accommodations, the potential increases for claims against the cruise lines when passengers are injured. Liability of the cruise lines for the injuries of passengers depends largely on where and how a passenger is injured. The standard of care owed by a shipowner to a passenger, and the theory of liability, are important considerations for the practitioner before filing suit. Did the shipowner have "notice" of a potential injurycausing condition before the injury occurred. In a particular circumstance is "notice" required in order to prevail against a shipowner. Recently, the 11th Circuit clearly explained the issue of "notice" and how it's applied when a cruise passenger is injured.

In the matter of <u>YUSKO V NCL</u> (Bah.), 2021 U.S. App. LEXIS 20502 (11th Cir. 2021), the issue before the court was whether a shipowner was liable when its employee negligently injured a passenger during a dance routine. The District Court ruled on summary judgment that because there had been no actual or constructive notice of a potential injury-causing condition prior to the injury, the shipowner was not liable for the passenger's injuries.

The 11th Circuit reviewed the liability of shipowners and notice requirements when a passenger is injured. Generally, liability claims against shipowners fall into two distinct categories: either a claim against the ship itself, often related to negligent maintenance of the premises; or a claim of vicarious liability based on the actions of a ship's employees.

Yusko's claim against NCL alleges an employee of the cruise line let go of her hand when she

was participating in a dance contest, causing her to fall and hit her head. In its Motion for Summary Judgment, NCL cited Keefe v. Bahama Cruise Line, Inc., 867 F.2d 1318,1322 (11th Cir. 1989) for the proposition Plaintiff had failed to give actual or constructive notice of the



risk-creating condition that led to her injuries. The District Court granted NCL's motion and the decision was appealed.

In overturning the ruling below, the Circuit Court agreed <u>Keefe</u> was "the correct standard of care against which a shipowner's conduct must be measured" and held that "the benchmark against which a shipowner's behavior must be measured is ordinary reasonable care under the circumstances." <u>Id</u> at 1322. "(A)s a prerequisite to imposing liability, the carrier must have had actual or constructive notice of the risk-creating condition... Id. Where passengers sued the shipowners for breaching the duty of care, the notice requirement governed because the passengers alleged wrongdoing by the shipowner itself.

In distinguishing Yusko, the Court determined <u>Yusko's</u> claim of vicarious liability was not based on the shipowner's conduct. "When the tortfeasor is an employee, the principle of vicarious liability allows "an otherwise non-faulty employer" to be held liable "for the negligent acts of [that] employee acting within the scope of employment."" <u>Langfitt v. Fed. Marine Terminals, Inc.</u>, 647 F.3d 1116, 1121 (11th Cir. 2011).

The Circuit Court held explicitly that "a passenger need not establish that a shipowner had actual or constructive knowledge of a risk-creating condition to hold a shipowner liable for the negligent acts of its employees". Yusko at [*14]. The matter was remanded to the District Court for further proceedings.

Many states have such laws on their books, though with a wide variety of who may institute the suit. For instance, our neighbor to the north, Georgia, apparently only authorizes counties providing support to the indigent to initiate suit. Delaware, Massachusetts, North Dakota, New Jersey, even Alaska have some form of duty imposed on the adult children of indigent parents. Some states, such as North Carolina, even criminalize failure to support one's indigent parent if able.

Jurisdiction over the child does become an issue if the child does not reside in the same state as the indigent parent. But what about residents of North Carolina who only maintain a temporary presence in Florida?

Florida, of course, has no such laws. We utilize Medicaid to help the elderly poor in need of medical assistance. Still, it is useful, before moving to another state, to take its filial responsibility laws into consideration.

The logic of these laws goes something like this: Before all of the taxpayers should have the burden of providing for impoverished adults, the law should look first to the children of the person seeking help from the state.

Typically, filial responsibility laws are enforceable, though little attention is given to them. then, in 2012, an impoverished woman who had been in full skilled nursing care in Pennsylvania was removed to Greece (the nation of her birth) which had socialized medicine. The facility was left with a huge, unpaid bill. The facility sued the

Common Problems with Employee Severance Agreements

As part of my law practice I regularly draft severance agreements for employers who desire to provide some pay to a departing employee. In Florida, employees are not entitled to any severance pay. Most Treasure Coast employers do not pay any severance when an employee quits or is fired. Sometimes a business or non-profit may feel benevolent and choose to pay severance. Sometimes the employer desires to mitigate risk of litigation and is willing to pay a severance in exchange for a waiver and release of claims.

This is where the business lawyer or in-house counsel might undertake the task of drafting a severance agreement. I mean, it is just a contract, right? We all took Contracts in law school. This is something we should be able to wing, right?

Well, apparently no. Although we all learned that "consideration" is necessary for a contract, I have seen lawyers draft a severance agreement that has the employee giving up certain rights in exchange for the employee's last paycheck or commission. Oops. That is not consideration. If the employee is already entitled to the money, then it cannot form the basis for consideration. What does this mean? Well, the employee can take the money and use it to hire a lawyer to sue the employer, because the severance agreement is worthless.

Another serious mistake that I see lawyers making when they take a hand at drafting a severance agreement is that they have no clue about the special language that must be included in the agreement in order to waive an age discrimination claim.

The Older Workers Benefit Protection Act ("OWBPA") sets minimum standards for evaluating the validity of waivers pertaining to claims under the Age Discrimination in Employment Act ("ADEA"). To be effective, any such waiver must be "knowing and voluntary." 29 U.S.C. § 626(f)(1); 29 C.F.R. § 1625.22. To be considered "knowing and voluntary," the waiver, must, at a minimum:

- be in writing, drafted in a manner calculated to be understood by the individual, or by the average individual eligible to participate;
- specifically refer to ADEA rights or claims;
- not waive rights or claims that may arise in the future (after the date of execution);
- be in exchange for consideration in addition to anything of value to which the individual is already entitled;
- advise the individual in writing to consult with an attorney prior to executing the agreement;
- provide the individual with at least twentyone (21) days within which to consider the agreement; and
- provide that the individual may revoke the agreement within seven (7) days of its execution.

29 U.S.C. § 626(f)(1); 29 C.F.R. § 1625.22.

FYI, the 21-day period may be waived, but the 7-day period cannot. So, it is crucial that an employer does not pay the employee any severance until after that seventh day!

Foreclosure Committee

Foreclosure Moratorium – Update: The foreclosure moratorium for federally backed mortgages is set to end on July 31, 2021 and the Biden Administration announced this will be the final extension of the moratorium. This moratorium does not apply to vacant/abandoned properties and privately owned mortgages. Foreclosure-related evictions of persons from properties that were secured by FHA-insured single-family mortgages are suspended until September 30, 2021.

<u>Vista Financial Group, LLC v. BONYM:</u>

In this case, the 3rd DCA evaluated if thirdparty purchasers from a foreclosure sale would be protected by Fla. Stat. §702.036 when they pursued a re-foreclosure of a junior lienholder because the junior lienholder was not named in the original foreclosure action. The only issue disputed was whether the third-party purchasers were affiliated with the foreclosing lender and the Court agreed with the trial court's reasoning that the act of purchasing property from an imperfect foreclosure action alone cannot create an affiliation with the foreclosing lender as it would prevent any third-party purchaser from being protected by Fla. Stat. § 702.036 if there was a defect in the foreclosure action. The Court affirmed the order dismissing the action to set aside the foreclosure judgment against the thirdparty purchasers.

Athene Annuity & Life Assurance Company v. Teavana Holdings:

In this case, the 5th DCA held a party cannot utilize a 1.540 motion to re-litigate issues previously addressed in a motion for rehearing.

Suarez v. BONYM:

In this case, both plaintiff and defendants moved for attorneys' fees pursuant to Fla. Stat. § 57.105 following an involuntary dismissal of the foreclosure action. Defendants moved for fees under subsection 7, which allows for reciprocal fees if there is a contractual basis for fees. The bank moved for fees under subsection 1 alleging defendants' motion for fees was frivolous. The 2nd DCA affirmed an order denying defendants' attorneys' fees because defendants failed to plead entitlement to fees in any pleading. The Court reversed a denial of bank's motion for fees because defendants' and their counsel knew or should have known their motion for fees was not supported by the application of then-existing law to the material facts.

Real Estate and Commercial Litigation Update

Florida Real Property and Business Litigation Report

Fisher v. PNC Bank, N.A., Case No. 20-10110 (11th Cir. 2021). A federal court is not limited by the Probate Exception and may exercise jurisdiction over a case brought by or involving an estate so long as doing so does not involve probating a will, administering the estate, or disposing of the estate's property.

Calderon v. Sixt Rent A Car, LLC, Case No. 20-10989 (11th Cir. 2021).

An arbitration clause which encompasses the arbitration of "claims" regarding "any services or products provided" requires arbitration only of the claims with the direct contracting party and not services affiliated with the contracting party.

Harris v. Jayo (In re: Harris), Case No. 19-11286 (11th Cir. 2021).

A state court default judgment must detail the factual background for the claims in the judgment in order to be given collateral estoppel effect in a § 523(a)(2)(A) proceeding.

Gartner v. Reverse Mortgage Solutions, Inc., Case No. 1D20-772 (Fla. 1st DCA 2021).

The First District follows *Castellanos v. Reverse Mortgage Funding LLC,* Case No. 3D20-472, 2021 WL 1897069 (Fla. 3d DCA May 12, 2021), and holds that the reciprocity provisions of Florida Statute section 57.105(7) apply even when the loan is non-recourse.

SG 2901, LLC v. Complimenti, Inc., Case No. 3D19-2131 (Fla. 3d DCA 2021).

The agent of an owner may recover fees for acting as the agent for construction work so long as a contractor licensed under Florida Statute section 489.105(3) performs the work set forth in the statute.

Petkovich v. Sandy Point Condominium Apartments Association, Inc., Case No. 3D20-1775 (Fla. 3d DCA 2021).

Claims regarding the circumstances surrounding the execution – but not the contents - of documents in a title record are not claims founded on a duly recorded instrument under Florida Statute section 48.23.

UN2JC Air 1, LLC v. Whittington, Case No. 4D20-1449 (Fla. 4th DCA 2021).

There is no need to conduct Independent Tort Doctrine analysis when the plaintiff is not a party to the contract.

Suarez v. The Bank of New York Mellon Trust Co., Case No. 2D20-1850 (Fla. 2d DCA 2021).

Failure to plead a demand for attorney's fees in a motion to dismiss negates the right to fees if the motion is granted, and continuing to seek fees under such circumstances will give the party whose complaint was dismissed the right to seek fees under Florida Statute section 57.105(7).

Golden Cape of Florida, Inc. v. Perez de Ospina, No. 3D21-0332 (Fla. 3d DCA 2021).

A county court does not have jurisdiction to adjudicate a claim for ejectment, even if the only action taken is to dismiss the case.

Bach v. Vlad Igor Investments, Inc., Case No. 4D20-1857 (Fla. 4th DCA 2021). The Fourth District re-affirms its holding in *Corporate Creations Enterprises LLC v. Brian R. Fons Attorney at Law P.C.*, 225 So. 3d 296 (Fla. 4th DCA 2017), and holds that Florida Statute sections 685.101 and 685.102 provide independent bases for long-arm jurisdiction so long as Constitutional requirements are met.

Athene Annuity & Life Assurance Company v. Teavana Holdings, Case No. 5D20-1848 (Fla. 5th DCA 2021).

A party may not use Florida Rule of Civil Procedure 1.540 to re-litigate issues previously decided under Rule 1.530.

Lee v. 1510 N.E. 109 St., LLC, Case No. 3D21-265 (Fla. 3d DCA 2021).

A tenant that seeks to interpose a COVID-19 related defense to eviction must still comply with Florida Statute section 83.60(2) and deposit rent into the Registry of the Court.

Community/Condotte/De Moya JV v. Circuit Court Judge, Case No. 3D21-1178 (Fla. 3d DCA 2021).

A circuit court judge has no discretion under Florida Statute section 44.104 to deny a stipulated Motion to Appoint Trial Resolution Judge.

St. Louis Condominium Association, Inc. v Rockhill Insurance Company, Case No. 19-12716 (11th Cir. 2021).

The failure to provide not one date for the deposition of a party's expert witness before discovery cutoff supports a magistrate judge's decision to exclude the witness.

Gulf Coast Solar Center I, LLC v. Busbee, Case No. 1D20-1439 (Fla. 1st DCA 2021).

A business located on federal property is not exempt from Florida personal property taxation simply because of the Federal Enclave Exemption to taxation.

City of St. Petersburg v. Dorchester Holdings, LLC, Case No. 2D20-463 (Fla. 2d DCA 2021).

A government responding to a records request under the Public Records Act must determine whether the requested records exist, locate the records, and review each record to determine if it is exempt from production, including attorney-client and work product, and the clerk of the government agency may charge a special service charge to cover investigative costs in addition to the costs of duplication, which special service fee must be paid in advance.

Powers v. Whitcraft, Case No. 4D21-194 (Fla. 4th DCA 2021).

A sublessor is bound by the Florida Landlord-Tenant Act, Florida Statutes Chapter 83.

The Board of County Commissioners, Santa Rosa County, Florida v. Home Builders Association of West Florida, Inc., Case No. 1D20-2227 (Fla. 1st DCA 2021).

Impact fees imposed without utilizing the "most recent and localized data" violates the Florida Impact Fee Act, Florida Statute section 163.31801(3)(a).

Mojito Splash, LLC v. City of Holmes Beach, Florida, Case No. 2D20-651 (Fla. 2d DCA 2021). A landowner has no claim under the Bert J. Harris, Jr., Private Property Rights Protection Act, Florida Statute sections 70.001-.80, if the landowner purchased the property with constructive knowledge of zoning ordinance and comprehensive plan provisions which disallowed the use for which the landowner seeks compensation under the Act.

Steven Enterprises Group Inc. v. Diversified Aero Inventory I, LLC, Case No. 3D20-487 (Fla. 3d DCA 2021).

An evidentiary hearing on a motion to enforce a settlement agreement due to default in payment is not necessary when it is clear the payments were not made.

Vista Financial Group, LLC v. The Bank of New York Mellon, Case No. 3D20-602 (Fla. 3d DCA 2021).

A purchaser at foreclosure sale is not "affiliated with the lender" merely because of the purchase at foreclosure sale and thus is entitled to protections of Florida Statute section 702.036.

CRSJ, Inc. v. Miami-Dade County, Case No. 3D20-1693 (Fla. 3d DCA 2021).

Injunction to stop a home-rule county from considering a legislative proposal (such as annexation) is not proper.



FRLS ON THE END OF CDC MORATORIUM ON EVICTIONS

The CDC Moratorium that was in place in the beginning of the pandemic for those affected by COVID-19 has been a lifesaving measure for many in our local community. Having lost jobs or the numerous other effects COVID-19 had, leaving many people in this country teetering on the brink of losing their homes. The original order put in place has come to an end. At the time I am writing this to you, there is a new moratorium in effect until October 3rd, though there is expected challenges and roadblocks for the new ban on evictions. Locally, there are still programs that are operational to continue to help landlords and renters, but all the assistance that is required is just not available.

One type of program that our office has implemented that has been beneficial for both landlords and tenants is a mediation program where attorneys assist in creating new rental agreements between landlords and tenants utilizing rental assistance available through the individual counties. In Indian River County, for example, the funds that have been approved for rental assistance have been used to cover past due as well as some future rent on tenants' properties and has given the tenant the ability to create a new rental agreement with the landlord. This is a win-win for the tenant and landlord and you as an attorney are in a unique position to help especially during this crisis. We are looking for attorneys to assist with mediating landlord/tenant disputes and assisting tenants with applications for rental assistance. Tenants can even be referred to an attorney for a private mediation or advice on how to handle a mediation with their landlord. Trainings will be available for any attorney who is interested in providing pro bono assistance with preserving housing and directing landlords and tenants to community resources.

As the federal government extended further assistance, there are still roadblocks and challenges expected that can hold up the assistance that is required for tenants to save their homes, and for landlords to receive rent. With COVID-19 cases on the rise again, members of our community

are being greatly affected and Florida Rural Legal Services and the Martin County Bar Association Pro Bono Committee is still looking for help. The need for attorneys who can help COVID-19 affected clients is high, and the number of clients who need assistance in other areas is growing as well.

October we are having our pro bono awards ceremony where our office will be recognizing the outstanding work that attorneys in our community have provided to our clients, but there is always more to do! This month Florida Rural Legal Services is issuing a challenge to the Martin County Bar Association, 45 new attorneys taking pro bono cases in 45 days. Speak with your colleagues, your partners, and your friends, and let them know we can assign pro bono cases in areas where they feel most comfortable, or they can even start by providing counsel and advice to help a client get their case started.


